If you are still not yet raising your hand, I am sure that there is something that you are struggling with or something that is stressing you out. If you haven't already completely shut down, and have stopped reading this article, I invite you to read the following story...

Ponderings

"One day a man came home after a long day at work. I suppose you could say that it had been a pretty normal day. He had awakened that morning with the usual mixture of anticipation and dread, excitement and boredom, satisfaction and regret — and a host of other emotions and attitudes not so easily labeled. His life didn't leave him feeling entirely whole, but he couldn't find anything that needed immediate attention either. Somewhere along the way, he had come to accept his own ambivalence as the way things were meant to be.

He walked into his house, closed the door, and locked it behind him. He didn't plan on going out again that night. Almost immediately, he regretted locking himself in. A light was on in the kitchen, and he heard a noise as if someone were in there. Before he could react, one way or another or even say anything, the kitchen door opened, and he stood face to face with . . . himself! At least that's who it looked like. Not only was it like looking in a mirror, but the intruder was eating what he had planned to eat for dinner and was wearing the clothes that should have been upstairs in his closet!

The effect the two of them had on each other was pure paralysis. They simply stared at each other, too surprised to move. But while there was little movement going on between them, lots of things were happening around them. A key turned in the door and in walked another image of himself. This one stopped half in and half out of the door when he saw the two of them. Another one came down the stairs dressed in his gym shorts, wearing his sneakers, and toting his tennis racquet.

Over and over again it happened. One image after another, differing only in slight variations of dress and purpose, walked through the door or came up from the basement or walked down the stairs. When they saw one another, they all stood there full of disbelief, confusion, and – if he were any measure of the rest of them – immense fear.

Suddenly One was in the room who was not one of them. He moved slowly and deliberately from image to image. He approached each one, placed his hands over the ears, looked the image straight in the face, said something, and moved on. As he moved throughout the room and touched one after the other, it seemed that the house was becoming less and less crowded. Finally he came to the man we started with, cupped his hands over our friend's ears, looked him straight in the face, and spoke carefully and distinctly, 'It's all right.'

As the words blew across his face, the man suddenly found himself alone in the room. Despite the unusual events of the past few minutes, he felt a sense of wholeness and peace that was unlike anything he had ever felt before. And he couldn't wait to see what was going to happen next!"*

God works through our relationships, through our worship, through our service, through our attempts at faithfulness to put us back together. God takes our brokenness, our fragmented-ness, and gently works in our daily lives to heal us and bring us to wholeness -- even when -- especially when -- we raise our hands and admit that we can't do it alone and that we need help. We all need to be reminded of God's love and care for us. See you in worship!
