

A pastor went to see a man who lived in his community -- a man who never came to church. "We would love to have you come to church, the pastor explained to the man." "But I can't," the man replied...and he gave no further explanation. "Well, why not?" the pastor asked. "Clothes. I don't have any good 'church-going' clothes," the man replied with downcast eyes. The man agreed and said that he would. The pastor went back and talked to some of the men from his church and they were able to raise over \$300.00 in order to buy the man some new clothes. The pastor, himself, went out and bought the man an expensive new suit, shirt, complete with socks and new undergarments and delivered them to the man. "Now," the pastor said, "you'll go to church on Sunday, right?" "I sure will, Pastor," the man said, smiling at the new suit. Well, Sunday morning came and the pastor looked out over the entire congregation but the man was not there. So the pastor anxiously went to the man's house that afternoon and the pastor found the man sitting on his front porch, reading the Sunday newspaper, wearing his new suit. "I thought you said that if we got you new clothes, you would go to church?" the pastor asked him. The man smiled and said, "Well, pastor, I did go to church. You see, when I put on this new suit it looked so good on me, that I went down the road to the Presbyterian Church!"

Getting new clothes at Easter was always a tradition in the Hoffman Family. In fact, it was on Easter Sunday sometime in the mid 70's when I got my first real "going to church" clothes. From pictures, I think I can remember seeing blue and orange plaid pants with a coordinating blue shirt and jacket (something that might be coming back into style these days). Of course my twin brother, Doug, and I were dressed alike. Imagine the picture...identical twins, ready for church, holding up chocolate Easter bunnies with their ear already bitten off. The new outfits that we were forced to wear, I am sure they felt more like straight jackets. But boy, did we look nice.

There is something about getting new clothes. They make you feel a little different. If they really look nice on you, you feel better about yourself. New clothes can make you feel brand new, good about yourself. How good it feels to discard the old clothes that are worn, torn, and ragged for a whole new wardrobe! A whole new look!

I believe that Easter is somewhat like that. Easter calls us from death to new life. It is the taking off of the old clothes, the old life, and putting on the new life, clothes that we cannot possibly afford to buy, but that are given freely to us by God. As we draw closer to Easter, let us turn from the old life and accept the gift of new life.

Generosity Moment

Filing for divorce, losing my home, and moving in with my parents and my young son as my 10-year marriage crumbled was humbling. But it was also a chance to rebuild my life and make sure it was in line with my values.

What I had felt was generous to give as a young adult starting a career didn't feel as generous as a 30-something with a larger income. I had a new opportunity to make sure what was important to me showed in how I shared my time and resources.

It is easy to give when we have been given so very much:

- God's unending forgiveness, love, and grace
- Parents who made having two extra houseguests feel like a joy and not a burden, despite tripping over train tracks, and occasional TV battles. ("No Fox News, Papa!" my preschooler declares to my father. "I want to watch cartoons.")
- An aunt dealing with challenges like Job who gives generously despite her overwhelming, unrelenting personal circumstances.

A little perspective can help remind us of what we may take for granted. For me, they included:

- A friend who had to face divorce and single motherhood alone, without the help of her parents or benefit of an education and a career, who offers encouraging words.
- A wise Epworth member, whose grace covers the scars of life's toughest challenges, advises volunteering and focusing on what others are facing.
- A child at daycare who at age 2 has lost his parents and shows scars and behavior were caused by abuse.
- A Wings of the Morning speaker who describes never having owned a pair of shoes until he was 9, in one of the poorest areas of the world.
- A funny press conference by Matt Damon, educating that more of the world has cell phones than has access to clean water and sanitation.

Sometimes doubts can interfere with our generosity: Do I agree with every spending decision the church makes? Should I give locally or globally? Will a friend in need or a man with a sign use my help for good or for evil?

In my mind, your gift in good faith is between you and God. How a person uses it is between them and God. When we are urged to go the second mile with someone who compels us to go one, God didn't say to ask if the

person was deserving, ask where he was going, or whether it was a wise journey. By being compelled or having clothing demanded, the description in Matthew 5:40-42 is of a thief or a robber, not a widow or an orphan in need. God said to give anyways...shower the world in love and astound people with the way you show it.

Sometimes the variety of choices can be overwhelming. There are so many good charities doing good work: ending malaria; supporting children in impoverished nations; responding to emergency needs with disasters abroad and hunger here at home. Whether you want to provide vaccines or support an orphanage, foster a neglected child, provide medical care to help a mother injured in childbirth or to a child with a curable disability, you cannot go wrong. If we all do SOMETHING, we will make the world better. Don't let the vast number of choices lull you into indecision and inaction.

At times, God nudges you to give specifically, sometimes for a need you may only be vaguely aware of. Listen to that voice!!! You may make a world of difference if you don't ignore the nudge.

Financial challenges may dramatically change our lives and our giving. In November, my workplace reorganized and I was laid off. I certainly cannot give as much as I did when I was working full-time. But there are many ways to give and show God's love generously with no or little financial cost:

- Helping feed the hungry at a community supper at St. Paul's Episcopal
- Picking up some groceries for a sick friend
- Checking in on an elderly neighbor in this challenging cold
- Offering a kind word or support or a listening, nonjudgmental ear, or sharing a time you were in challenging circumstances and God came through for you

The Five Love Languages for Singles offers ideas on how to show your love in a variety of ways, from improving a relationship with a troubled coworker to enhancing a strained relationship with loved one. Many times it takes just a little bit of thought, time, and understanding.

Why not give generously? It feels great!

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY



During one of our RV journeys, Rick and I worshiped in a church in Nova Scotia. It was one of those beautiful white-sided churches with well caredfor grounds, and the adjacent cemetery was immaculately groomed. Inside we were quickly greeted by the minister, who moved us along into the sanctuary with a brisk "good morning"

handshake. We found a pew near the back. An older couple sitting nearby welcomed us and inquired about our travels. Then we settled in to look around before the service began. It was a beautiful traditional sanctuary, with a single center aisle leading to the chancel area where there was an ornately carved pulpit, seating for the choir, a simple altar, and above the altar, a large screen for viewing the order of worship and hymn lyrics. During the morning announcements, we listened as the Trustee chair reported with pride on the newly renovated steeple. I, however, could hardly focus. My mind was adding up the attention given to honor the dead, and the resources dedicated to the steeple, yet there was not a single child in attendance! In fact, there wasn't a person under the age of 50, I'd guess. Later, I asked the kind couple who had welcomed us, "Where are the children? Do they have a separate worship space?" She responded, "Well, we really don't have any children, I suppose. We used to have a worship time for the kids downstairs, but we don't really need to do that now." Sometimes one needs to take a journey away, to recognize the blessings of home. I am filled with gratitude to the Epworth congregation who has joyfully welcomed children into our worship service, into our budget, into our hearts. You have placed an importance on their spiritual growth, and their participation in the church. You have welcomed children at the Communion Table and into the Family of God. I am grateful to be a part of a congregation that takes seriously Jesus 'words, "Let the little children come unto me..."





\$15,000 in relief support.

Marion County to receive grant money from UMCOR

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) has approved a \$50,000 grant to assist with recovery needs from the December 2013 Marion County Flood that affected the communities of LaRue, Prospect and Green Camp. The request for the grant support was submitted by the Director of Connectional Mission and Justice for the West Ohio Conference and the Capitol Area North District Disaster Coordinator. The West Ohio Conference is also providing

On December 24, 2013, LaRue, Ohio and surrounding areas experienced extensive flooding that impacted homes that have not been damaged in previous floods. Due to drainage improvements in the county immediately north of Marion County, flood waters are now backing up quicker in these communities resulting in surge flooding. The community is working with government agencies to correct this problem, however, the flooding will continue until corrections to the river flow are completed.

The response by LaRue United Methodist Church and other area United Methodist churches, along with the Capitol Area North Disaster Response team in partnership with the Red Cross and other community organizations have been tremendous. Recently Rev. Deb Berry became the new case manager and is in place working with those impacted by the flooding.

According to recent census data, 19.6 % of people in Marion County live below the poverty line. Given this socioeconomic reality, community leaders and partners anticipate a disproportional amount of unmet needs. The grant application provides funding for: Case management for affected families, assistance for families to replace household furnishings, mold remediation, reconstruction and repair of households, assistance for security deposits/first month rent for renters needing to relocate and, developing a sustaining partnership with the area to lessen the impact of future flooding by providing training, awareness and developing disaster plans for proactive action.

The recovery will be a primarily volunteer driven project with only direct expenses being reimbursed for the case management team and other leadership. Volunteers will be used to assist affected families with repairs and rebuilding and a team of people will be identified, trained and deployed to develop relationships with community citizens to prepare for future floods and lessen potential damage.
