

The Invitation

"...On that day, when evening had come, Jesus said to them, 'Let us go across to the other side'...." (Mark 4:35-41)

There is an invitation. And isn't that where it always begins? An invitation, a suggestion, a calling, an asking by someone to go with, to journey beside, to try something new, to risk taking that next step. That's how the over-sea voyage started for the disciples that evening.



Pastor's Ponderings

"Just sit right back and you'll hear a tale, a tale of a fateful trip, that started from this tropic port, aboard this tiny ship. The mate was a mighty sailing man; the skipper brave and sure. Five passengers set sail that day; for a three hour tour, a three hour tour. The weather started getting rough. The tiny ship was tossed, if not for the courage of the fearless crew, the Minnow would be lost; the Minnow would be lost." 98 episodes later, their journey on Gilligan's Island was over. (I invite you to read the rest of the Mark text, Mark 4:35-41, to find out what happened to the disciples.)

The invitation is our beginning. It is always the beginning. The invitation of faith and our acceptance of that invitation, even if it is at the prompting or threats from loving parents – we do believe in prevenient grace, puts all of us together in the same boat. There is no distinction - we are all in it together. And being in the boat gives us rights and responsibilities - but probably more responsibilities than rights, especially when we choose to follow Jesus. Most of the time, we have no idea where that invitation will lead us. That can be exhilarating and exciting, and yet cause us to be a bit overwhelmed and fearful. We are asked to do new things and to go where we have never gone before; we are asked to use the gifts we have been given, (those gifts that are apparent to us and those yet to be discovered); we are asked to use our gifts sometimes in new and unexpected ways; we are asked to give more, more than we ever thought that we had to give; and we are asked to tell others about our journey and ask them to follow and join us. We agree to all of this when we accept the invitation that God has placed upon our lives. God never stops inviting us, regardless of whether or not we think that we have arrived at our final destination.

We are invited to continue the journey knowing that the Church, Christ's hands and feet, never stops inviting us into deeper waters — into deeper commitment. We are never alone — we are in the same boat together! Christ journeys with us!

Did you know?

First impressions are lasting ones, people make up their minds about our church within the first ten minutes of contact with the congregation. Long before the pastor preaches, people most often will have decided if they plan to return.

Here are some suggestions to make our church more welcoming to visitors...

Circle of 10: Greet anyone, member or guest, who comes within ten feet of you. Make a special effort to greet the people you don't already know within your Circle of 10. It's as simple as, "Hi, my name is ————. I don't think we've met. What's your name?"

Rule of 3: Try not to talk to other members for the first three minutes after the service. Talk only to those you don't know and to people that you know are guests. It takes guests about three minutes to exit the church after worship so it's important to make sure someone has made contact with them before they leave.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC)

The Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) met recently to discuss and consider how to prioritize Pastor David's time to best serve the needs of Epworth UMC. Using a tool provided in the "Starting Well" seminar, hosted by the Capitol Area North District, members of the committee considered twelve areas that comprise a pastor's time serving the church and its people. Considering the unique needs of our congregation, the size of our church, and feedback from the recent congregational survey, the SPRC prioritized the areas into three categories: 1. Where most of the pastor's time should be spent, 2. Where some of the pastor's time should be spent, and 3. Where little of the pastor's time should be spent. After much discussion, the SPRC members determined that to best serve the needs of Epworth, the majority of Pastor David's time should be spent in the following areas:

- ♦ **Leading Worship and Preaching** planning and conducting worship services, including sermon preparation and working with others who lead and participate in worship.
- ♦ **Leading** serving as the leader of leaders in the congregation, the person who articulates the vision and focuses the work of the whole congregation on that vision.
- ♦ Teaching planning and/or teaching classes for church school teachers, teaching short term classes, teaching the confirmation classes, training laity in evangelism, leadership, etc.
- ♦ Administration serving as the "executive" to the congregation, working with the committees, helping to plan the financial program of the church, working with committees on the planning and implementing of programs.

While we believe that these are the most important areas of focus, these are not the only areas where Pastor David will spend his time. These areas are simply meant to represent a majority of the pastor's time serving the church. We feel that focusing on these areas will allow us to prosper and grow as a congregation and to continue to serve our community and the Kingdom of God.



Safe Sanctuary Training - Two More Opportunities This Year

Epworth Church is committed to providing safety and security for children and youth within our ministries, as well as protection for our staff and volunteers. Since April, 40 volunteers and staff members have completed a 90 minute class in Safe Sanctuary Procedures, and they've also had background checks. By September we hope to be a fully compliant Safe Sanctuary church - meaning that ALL volunteers with children and youth, as well as all church staff, have been trained in our child protection policy and procedures. If you teach children or youth Sunday School classes, help with Children's Worship, chaperone youth events, go on mission trips with youth, help with childcare for Marion Matters or other church events, or if you want to get involved in any of these activities, you are especially invited to attend one the Safe Sanctuary Training classes in August: Tuesday, August 28 at 6:30 p.m. OR Wednesday, August 29 at 10:00 a.m. It takes a whole church to keep children safe!!! Epworth Youth

Prattsville, New York, a small town situated in the Catskills Mountains has a population of approximately 700 and sits on the banks of the Schoharie Creek. You may wonder what that has to do with Epworth United Methodist Church.

On June 16th of this year, 6 youth and 2 adults journeyed to Prattsville to help with damage caused by flash flooding from Hurricane Irene on August 28, 2011. The town was almost wiped off the map. Remember when I mention it was located along a creek? The creek rose 15 feet in under 12 hours. According to reports from the Greene County Administrator, the rainwater coming off the Catskills sent a volume of water that was greater than Niagra Falls through this small community. It wasn't standing water, but rushing water that washed away people's homes and livelyhood. There was a porch across the street from where we stayed, the house had been washed off its foundation and could be seen about 3 lots down smashed against a tree. As we journeyed down Main Street many houses still stand condemned, parts of their foundations washed away.

Our group stayed and worked at the Prattsville United Methodist Church which was built in 1834. They told us the most water they ever had in the past was 18" in the basement. This storm sent 4 feet of rushing water through their sanctuary.



Epworth can be very proud of the young men and women who went on this mission. We were a small group, but mighty. Our young people cleared out debris around the foundation of the church, mixed cement, put up insulation and did the prep work for replacing siding on the church and the connecting building which contained the basement and dining area. We used quite a bit of our hammering and measuring skills. We also learned the importance of sharing work space and the art of being patient, after all Rome wasn't built in a day. Some of the youth learned how to use a brake. This piece of machinery would bend the flashing that was put up against the foundation to help keep water out. They also were able to finish one side of the church with siding. Besides the work at the church, our youth, at various times, helped mucking out a garage, mowing, cleaning up brush and helping our host and guide, Charlie, gather supplies.

We also participated in activities at the church by attending Sunday School, Bible Study, and church services. Since the sanctuary is in the process of being redone, all worship activities are held in the dining room. We also got to meet other teams. There was a team there from Illinois and one from Reynoldsburg, Ohio. All volunteers met at the church dining area for a sack lunch and breaks. A couple of evenings we went up the mountain to the Christian Training Center where the other teams were housed. That facility includes dorms, meeting areas, and a gym. This center was used for housing evacuees during and after the flood. Many people were brought there in their mud-caked night clothes, no shoes, etc. They ended up using their gymnasium for a pantry which resembled a large store, with aisles for different items such as food, clothing, water, toiletries etc. Just a side note: Remember the health kits we gathered? We saw kits at the church that had been delivered and were being used.

The people of Prattsville and their neighbors have been working non-stop for the last 10 months trying to rebuild. There are signs throughout the town saying "rebuilding Prattsville one building at a time." A few of the houses are being lived in.

Some of the businesses are reopened in new or partially rebuilt buildings. The Prattsville UMC still holds their services and activities despite not having their sanctuary completely finished. The parsonage is stripped down to the floor joists and they were hoping to start work soon.

So the next time you see Brandon Barkeloo, Nick Foos, Taylor Hamilton, CJ Napper, Tre Potter or Heather Slob, tell them how proud you are of the way the youth have represented our church. It was a job well done.

FESTIVAL OF SHARING

September 29, Otterbein University

It is time to be thinking about sharing our resources with people who are hurting throughout the world. We can do that by making up kits. You may complete a kit or provide money to purchase supplies for the kits. Please pay close attention to the various kits as there have been some changes. DO NOT include monies with your kits.

Please make your check payable to Epworth Church and mark it for Festival of Sharing.

Health Kit

- 1 hand towel (no fingertip or bath towels)
- 1 bar of soap (bath size—in original wrapper or box)
- 1 washcloth
- 1 toothbrush (in original packaging)
- 1 wide-tooth comb
- 6 band-aids
- 1 nail clipper

Wrap all the smaller items in the towel. Place in a 1-gallon plastic bag with zipper closure, remove excess air from bag and seal.

(Value—\$10; processing cost: \$2 per kit)

Layettes

6 cloth diapers

- 2 diaper pins
- 2 T-shirts or undershirts (no onesies)
- 1 sweater/sweatshirt
- 2 washcloths
- 2 gowns/sleepers
- 2 receiving blankets

Items must be new and under 12 months in size.

Wrap items inside one of the receiving blankets and

secure with both diaper pins.

(Value—\$39; processing cost: \$2 per kit)

School Kits

- 1 blunt metal scissors (rounded tip)
- 1 hand-held pencil sharpener

Three 70-count spiral notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages. (No loose-leaf or filler paper)

- 6 new pencils with erasers
- 1 30-cm metric ruler
- 1 large eraser
- 1 box of 24 crayons (only 24)

1 (12x14" to 14" x 17" finished size) cloth bag with handles. Please no reusable shopping bags or backpacks.

Place all items in the bag, fold the top over and secure with two large rubber bands.

(Value—\$15; processing cost \$2 per kit)

Frequently Asked Questions:

- 1. **Can anything else be added to the kits?** No additional items can be added to the Kits, and items are limited to only those listed so that all Kit recipients receive the same materials.
- 2. Can we include religious or other symbols on the components or in the Kits? Please do not decorate Kits with religious or governmental symbols or include components with these symbols. Kits are shared with people based only on need, regardless of religion, and should not be used as a way of persuading people to share your religious or political beliefs.
- 3. **May I designate my Kits for a particular location?** The Kits you provide are packed with other same-type Kits and prepared for shipment to various points throughout the world, when and where the need is the greatest.
- 4. **Can we include a note with our Kits?** For some Kit recipients to read the note, it would have to be translated into his or her own language. Because this is a time-consuming and costly process, and is outside the scope of the CWS Kit Program, please do not include notes.

Please do not include personal notes, artwork, checks or cash.

Following is some information received from Church World Services regarding the Kits that you provide through Festival of Sharing:

As you may be aware, Ohio collects one-third of all of the Kits collected in the entire United States each year! This helps Church World Service respond to the many disasters here at home and round the world. In the past year CWS has responded to tornadoes, hurricanes, floods and famine. When Hurricane Irene hit the eastern United States, CWS was able to respond immediately. Because of our work in the past year, we must replenish our stock of Kits to make sure we are always prepared for the worst. It is only through your hard work that CWS can continue to respond quickly and efficiently through the Kit Program.

Please know that your continued support of the Kit Program makes a big difference in the lives of many people. Each Kit represents a person whose life will be changed because of the simple items contained within.


