As we find ourselves in the midst of our stewardship season, I invite you to read the following witness delivered by Ben Harper on Sunday, October 13. His words are challenging and from the heart.

Growing in Generosity, Rev. David Hoffman

Speaking on the topic of generosity is difficult for me because at its root, being generous is not something that comes naturally to me. I don't want to characterize myself as selfish, thoughtless, or unkind, but the act of being generous and giving feely of your time and resources is, in fact, a challenge. How do I distinguish between "worthy" and "unworthy" generosity? Is there such a thing as "unworthy generosity"? If I give a few dollars to a group that already has a great deal of funds, does this still count as being generous? What if I could have truthfully given more than just a few dollars? Are my few dollars going to do anything anyway? Could I have chosen a more deserving group?

What If I don't know exactly how my donation is going to be spent, is it less generous than say volunteering at a soup kitchen? What if I volunteer at a soup kitchen, but my job is just to take out the trash. Is this worth less than actually serving the food to those in need? What if I only help out for a few hours because I have some errands to run later that afternoon? Does this count as being generous or do I need to stay for the entire day? Do I just wait and go on a day where I know that I don't have anything else going on? Or what do you do in a situation when you don't have enough resources to give? How does God expect me to give away what I don't have or what I have but I know I need?

It's tough working 12 hour days, with an hour and a half commute. I barely have enough time as it is when I get home to eat, get the kids in the tub, read books and get them ready for bed, pack lunches, get things organized for the next day, and get myself cleaned up and to bed to possibly commit to anything else. And with limited time during the week, on weekends, being a good dad always needs to come first.

Then, inevitably, there's always a prior commitment of some sort that makes it impossible to give up time that just isn't there. Not to mention those countless, yet essential, household duties that need done just to keep things in order and running smoothly. And financially coming from a one income family, I need to budget and plan and make every dollar count; I have to listen to all those financial experts scaring me to death, telling me how much college is going to cost when my kids get to that age. l've got retirement planning to think about; I need to be smart and hold some back for medical emergencies, or in case a car needs new brakes or the water heater decides to quit.

I'm a realist; practical, calculated. My decisions are made carefully with proper thought and consideration. But is this wrong? Is this the way that God wants me to be careful? Thoughtful? Planned? Possibly; but probably not *completely*. All of us have qualities or gifts that we were born with, others we learn, things we pick up in school, social groups, or develop, as we grow older. Some good; some not so good; and some we know are good, but still elude us.

Fortunately for me I have a person in my life that helps me make up for my shortcomings; who has helped me in growing my spirituality and building my

faith; who questions my thoughts and intentions and reminds me that thinking, speaking, and acting are not independent of each other. Luckily for me, my mentor also happens to be my wife and my complete polar opposite - Spontaneous, selfless, impulsive, and altruistic. She has taught me to give with my heart and not my head; that over-thinking leads to doubt; that doubt leads to reluctance; and reluctance leads to missed opportunities; that giving should not be followed by "away" or "up", but rather, should be proceeded by "joyful" or "freely"; and that being generous is not just writing a check each week to the church and volunteering each year to serve at the Christmas Eve supper (although still very important).

I've grown in my faith through the relationship I've had with my wife in <u>countless</u> ways, but none more significantly or importantly than in my spirit of generosity. She has led me to think outside of the comfort of my home and my church to the needs of my community and other communities around the world in reaffirming my faith - that truly knowing Jesus is by showing it and practicing it in my daily life and following his word that "it <u>is</u> more blessed to give than receive."

Teachers would be required to have new FBI and BCI background checks conducted in order to sub for us. Determine whether your gift will be for a boy or a girl, and the child's age category: 2-4, 5-9, or 10-14. Use the appropriate boy/girl label (located on bulletin board in main Epworth hallway). Mark the correct age category on the label, and tape the label to the top of your box.

3) FILL WITH GIFTS

Fill the box with a variety of gifts that will delight a child. Use the gift ideas provided at the end of this article. Please include at least one item a child can immediately embrace such as a stuffed toy, doll, and ball or toy truck.

4) INCLUDE \$7 DONATION

Please donate \$7 or more for each shoebox you prepare to help cover shipping and other project costs. You can write a check to **Samaritan's Purse (note "OCC" on memo line)** and place it in an envelope on top of the gift items inside your box. If you are preparing more than one shoebox, please combine shipping donation in one check.

5) DROP OFF

Place a rubber band around each completed and closed shoebox and drop it off at the collection center nearest you during the Collection Week, November 18–25, 2013. The local drop off location is Marion Christian Center, 1550 Richland Road, Marion.
