Learning to Teach and Teaching to Learn

(The following is an excerpt from the sermon given by Melissa Hoffman on Sunday, August 17. Thank you Dan, Bill, and Melissa for filling in during my mission experience to Africa! Dan, Mark, Cameron, and I will be sharing about our mission experience to the Congo on Sunday, September 21.)

You see, Jesus is the greatest teacher to have ever lived. A great teacher aims not at simply dispensing information, but at changing lives. A master teacher doesn't just give lectures; he or she creates experiences for people. This kind of teacher knows that truth is most powerful when people have to work to discover it. The new truth discovered here has a much deeper impact than just the truth being presented. And a master teacher is able to teach more than one person or group at a time. Their teaching is going on at different levels. A master teachers' methods are not always clear to their students at the time and may be seen as harsh, cruel, and unclear, or not even recognized following the lesson until a much later time.

There is a story many years ago of an elementary teacher. Her name was Mrs. Thompson. And as she stood in front of her 5th grade class on her very first day of school, she told the children a lie. Like most teachers, she looked at her students and said that she loved them all the same. But that was impossible, because there in the front row, slumped in his seat, was a little boy named Teddy Stoddard.

Mrs. Thompson had watched Teddy the year before and noticed that he didn't play well with the other children, that his clothes were messy and that he constantly needed a bath. And Teddy could be unpleasant. It got to the point where Mrs. Thompson would actually take delight in marking his papers with a broad red pen, making bold X's and then putting a big "F" at the top of his papers.

At the school where Mrs. Thompson taught, she was required to review each child's past records, and she put Teddy's off until last. However, when she reviewed his file, she was in for a surprise. Teddy's first grade teacher wrote, "Teddy is a bright child with a ready laugh. He does his work neatly and has good manners... he is a joy to be around." His second grade teacher wrote, "Teddy is an excellent student, well-liked by his classmates, but he is troubled because his mother has a terminal illness, and life at home must be a struggle." His third grade teacher wrote. "His mother's death has been hard on him. He tries to do his best, but his father doesn't show much interest, and his home life will soon affect him if some steps aren't taken." Teddy's fourth grade teacher wrote, "Teddy is withdrawn and doesn't show much interest in school. He doesn't have many friends and sometimes sleeps in class."

By now, Mrs. Thompson realized the problem, and she was ashamed of herself. She felt even worse when her students brought her Christmas presents, wrapped in beautiful ribbons and bright paper, except for Teddy's. His present was clumsily wrapped in the heavy, brown paper that he scissored from a grocery bag. Mrs. Thompson took pains to open it in the middle of the other presents. Some of the children started to laugh when she found a rhinestone bracelet with some of the stones missing and a bottle that was one quarter full of perfume. But she stifled the children's laughter when she exclaimed how pretty the bracelet was, putting it on, and dabbing some of the perfume on her wrist. Teddy Stoddard stayed after school that day just long enough to say, "Mrs. Thompson, today you smelled just like my Mom used to." After the children left she cried for at least an hour.

On that very day, she quit teaching reading, and writing, and arithmetic. Instead, she began to teach <u>children</u>. Mrs. Thompson paid particular attention to Teddy. As she worked with him, his mind seemed to come alive. The more she encouraged him, the faster he responded. By the end of the year, Teddy had become one of the smartest children in the class and, despite her lie that she would love all the children the same, Teddy became one of her "teacher's pets."

A year later, she found a note under her door, from Teddy, telling her that she was still the best teacher he ever had in his whole life. Six years went by before she got another note from Teddy. He then wrote that he had finished high school, third in his class, and she was still the best teacher he ever had in his whole life. Four years after that, she got another letter, saying that while things had been tough at times, he'd stayed in school, had stuck with it, and would soon graduate from college with the highest of honors. He assured Mrs. Thompson that she was still the best and favorite teacher he ever had in his whole life. Then four more years passed, and yet another letter came. This time, he explained that after he got his bachelor's degree, he decided to go a little further. The letter explained that she was still the best and favorite teacher he ever had. But now his name was a little longerthe letter was signed, Theodore F. Stoddard. M.D.

The story doesn't end there. You see, there was yet another letter that spring. Teddy said he'd met this girl and was going to be married. He explained that his father had died a couple of years ago, and he was wondering if Mrs. Thompson might agree to sit in the place at the wedding that was usually reserved for the mother of the groom. Of course, Mrs. Thompson did. And guess what? She wore that bracelet, the one with several rhinestones missing. And she made sure she was wearing the perfume that Teddy remembered his mother wearing on their last Christmas together. They hugged each other, and Dr. Stoddard whispered in Mrs. "Thank Thompson's ear. you Mrs.Thompson for believing in me. Thank you so much for making me feel important and showing me that I could make a difference." Mrs. Thompson, with tears in her eyes, whispered back. She said, "Teddy, you have it all wrong. You were the one who taught me that I could make a difference. I didn't know how to teach until I met vou."

Christ calls us to meet everyone where they are and to be Christ's presence in this hurting world.

Generosity Increases Our Happiness

By definition, generosity is the giving of money, talents, time, valuable resources, and acts of kindness. Stewardship is the responsibility of being the overseer and protector of something considered worth caring for: property, treasured items, and finances. You can have generosity without being a steward, but God asks us to look at the two words as a marriage of action and a state of mind. "Each of you should use whatever gifts you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms" (1 Peter 4:10 NIV)

The Epworth United Methodist congregation has for many years been an example of extravagant generosity and stewardship by hosting the Neighborhood Supper and Christmas Eve Dinner. As the Missions Committee spearheads the events, those folks personify stewardship by careful cost planning and watchful care of financial donations graciously contributed by congregational members. It is without a doubt that the community members who are served at these events experience a bountiful, abundant table, along with radical hospitality. The kindness of our congregation members exemplifies the generosity of giving of time, talents, and unconditional love, as their hands prepare, serve, and tidy up after each dinner.

How do two Mission ministries within our church thrive and be so long lived? There are many answers, but I feel the scripture found in Proverbs 11:25 is a valuable response. It reads. "The generous will prosper; those who refresh will others themselves be refreshed." (New Living Bible) Scientists and philosophers for years have tried to come to terms with what exactly causes generosity in humans. It seems that being generous causes one to want to continue being generous. A scientific study (P.J. Adams, A.A. Stanton & S. Adams, November, 2007) proved people who actively took part being generous to a stranger had a substantial increase in an isolated chemical hormone in their brain. The researchers supported the belief that in being generous we, therefore, feel good about being generous. For me, it is no accident that our brains actually increase mental messages of self-esteem, optimism, trust, and helpfulness when we participate in generous behaviors. Our Creator intended for us to feel good about our bigheartedness!

Shel Silverstein's book The Giving Tree (1964, Harper& Row) is the epitome of generosity. The character of the tree gives dimension to the scripture "those who others will refresh themselves be refreshed." Most of you know the story in which a giving tree loved a boy. The boy loved the tree and would swing from her branches and nap in her shade. And the tree was happy. As the boy grows older, he needs money to support himself, means to build a house, and a method of transportation. So the giving tree tells the boy to take her apples to sell. She gives her branches so he can make a home and tells the boy to cut down her trunk to make a boat. And each time she was generous, the Giving Tree was happy. Finally, the boy returns to the tree as an old man. The tree is delighted to see the boy, but now she is without anything to give. The boy whispers to her with a weary smile, "I don't need very much now, just a quiet place to rest," "Well," said the tree, "An old stump is still good for that. Come boy, sit down. Sit down and rest a while." And the boy did. And the tree was happy.

The extravagant generosity of our congregation has refreshed our community, our nation, and our world. In what ways can you identify the innumerable forms of generosity and stewardship as one who worships at Epworth? God calls us to strengthen our relationship with Him by using wisdom in our role as stewards and by being generous in various opportunities we encounter on a daily basis. Indeed, as in the example of the *Giving Tree*, we rejuvenate the happiness in ourselves by being generous to others.

Our school-age summer camp transitioned from full-time to before and after school once again. We would like to give a special thank you to our summer staff members: Abbie Dunn, Leslie Schultz, and Emily Atkinson. Without them, we would not have been able to go on all of our fun summer field trips, and our school-agers would have missed out on The Marion Historical Society's Annual Blast from the Past event.

Our school-agers spend lots of time and effort in the summer raising money for organizations in need. This summer, our school-agers chose to donate funds to Imagine No Malaria. With hard work and determination, our students were able to raise \$145.00 for Imagine No Malaria. We gifted the money to Dan Erickson before he departed for the mission team's journey to the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Dan Erickson has promised to return to the school -age classroom to share his experience with them.

Divorce Care

Divorce Care begins at Epworth on Tuesday, September 16th from 6:30-8:00pm. All are welcome for this ten weeks series. Most people will tell you that separation and divorce are the most painful and stressful experiences they've ever faced. It's a confusing time when you feel isolated and have lots of questions about issues you've never faced before. Our Divorce Care group meets weekly to help you face these challenges and move toward rebuilding your life. Each Divorce Care session begins with a video Seminar with Experts--persons knowledgeable in how to heal from the pain of divorce and how to move forward. After viewing the video, Divorce Care group participants spend time as a support group with one another, discussing what was presented in that week's video seminar, as well as what is going on in the lives of group members. Licensed social worker Elizabeth Claborn and Dr. Damon Osborne will lead this fall's Divorce Care at Epworth. Persons may register for Divorce Care by calling 387-8344. Childcare will be available.

DC4K, Divorce Care for Kids, will also meet on Tuesdays, 6:30-8:00 and begins on September 16.

Divorce Care for Kids at Epworth UMC serves children ages 5-12 who have experienced, or are experiencing, the separation or divorce of their parents. Closely related to the adult Divorce Care ministry, the DC4K support group helps children understand that they are not the cause of their parents' divorce, that God loves all kinds of families, and how to have healthy communication skills. Each of the 10 class sessions will include prayer, a video Bible story, art activities, games, healthy snacks, and greeting and closing rituals. Our adult leaders, called SafeKeepers, have met our Safe Sanctuary requirements, including background checks and have considerable professional skills to work with hurting children. PROGRESS IS BEING MADE

Malaria was eliminated in the U.S. in the 1950s; however, in Sub-Saharan Africa, malaria continues to kill primarily a woman or a child every 60 seconds. But there is hope! The money raised by "Imagine No Malaria" is bringing about important changes to eradicate malaria once and for all. These changes include availability of bed nets, providing access to diagnostic tests and medicine, draining standing water, and improving sanitation. New radio stations as well as providing hand-cranked and solarpowered radios ensure greater numbers of people are receiving life-saving information about malaria. Hundreds of hospitals, clinics, and health outposts operated by The United Methodist Church in Africa now have the diagnostic tests and treatment needed to save lives. Thousands of local health care workers have been empowered to train their communities about avoiding malaria, going door-to-door to deliver and install bed nets, along with teaching people how to properly use and care for the nets.

Festival of Sharing kits make a difference in the lives of children and families around the

world. Most often these kits are sent to areas after a disaster, like Hurricane Sandy on the East Coast or flooding in different states, including (LaRue) Ohio. Syria and Nicaragua have received many school kits and hygiene kits respectively. The 2014 Festival of Sharing will be September 27 at Otterbein University. Completed kits, including a \$2 processing and shipping cost, should be brought to Epworth no later than Sept. 21.

SCHOOL KIT:

One pair of blunt metal scissors (rounded tip); One box of 24 crayons (only 24!); Three 70-count spiral notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages (no loose-leaf or filler paper); One 30-centimeter ruler (12"); One hand-held pencil sharpener; One large eraser; Six new pencils with erasers; One 12" x 14" to 14" x 17" finished size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with cloth handles. (Please, no reusable shopping bags or

backpacks.) Pack all items inside the cloth bag. Please include: \$2 per Kit (processing/ shipping cost)

HYGIENE KIT:

One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels please); One washcloth; One wide-tooth comb; One nail clipper; One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper); One toothbrush (in original packaging); Six standard size Band-Aids[®]. Place all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure; remove excess air from bag and seal. Please do not add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Cartons of toothpaste that have an extended expiration date will be added to Hygiene Kit shipments just prior to shipment. Please include \$2 per Kit (processing/shipping cost)

BABY CARE KIT:

Six cloth diapers; Two diaper pins; Two Tshirts or undershirts (no onesies); Two washcloths; Two gowns or sleepers; One sweater or sweatshirt (Can be hand-knitted or crocheted); Two receiving blankets (one can be a hand-knitted or crocheted baby blanket). Items must be new and under 12 months in size. Wrap items inside one of the receiving blankets and secure with both diaper pins.

Please include: \$2 per Kit (processing/ shipping cost)

EMERGENCY CLEANUP BUCKET:

Those interested in creating Emergency Cleanup Buckets can get a list of supplies needed from the church office or the bulletin board in the hallway. Note: Because of the volatility of the contents, Emergency Cleanup Buckets are not shipped internationally but used exclusively in the United States.


